

Appointed Counsel for Indigent Tenants:

A Proven, Cost-Effective Strategy to Prevent Homelessness

EVICTION FILINGS ARE AT AN ALL-TIME HIGH

Eviction filings in FY 2025 reached 24,368–47.6% higher than the FY 2019 baseline of 16,505. For more than 10,000 low-income Washingtonians each year, eviction defense can be the difference between housing stability and the trauma of displacement and homelessness.

The Appointed Counsel for Indigent Tenants Program (RCW 59.18.640) is a proven homelessness prevention tool. It ensures tenants on the brink of losing their homes have a fair chance in court and access to all available resources. This program is not only about legal defense—it is about keeping families housed, preventing homelessness, reducing the trauma of eviction, and lowering the downstream costs of homelessness.

PROGRAM IMPACT

- Over 30,000 low-income Washingtonians have been served since the program began in January 2022.
- More than 10,000 people are served each year.

CLIENT STORY

A tenant fell behind on rent due to financial coercion from her ex-partner, who demanded money from her every time she was paid. Her attorney helped her create a safety plan to prevent further contact, set a realistic budget, and apply for child support through DSHS. With rental assistance from the Eviction Prevention Program (EPP), the attorney was able to keep her in her home.

- **Housing Stability:** 90% of closed cases resulted in permanent housing solutions; 60% allowed tenants to remain in their homes.

 47% BIPOC; 39% people with disabilities.

FUNDING REQUEST

Maintaining these critical services during the continuing crisis requires continuation of the current budget and approval of \$3 million in supplemental funding for FY 2027. Without this supplemental funding we will lose 17 full-time attorneys and nearly 2,000 individuals facing eviction each year without an attorney.
